Oboe Concerto in C Major, K. 314, Allegretto

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (January 27, 1756 – December 5, 1791)
Oboe Concerto in C major, K. 314 (271k), was composed in the spring
or summer of 1777, for the oboist Giuseppe Ferlendis (1755–1802) from
Bergamo. In 1778, Mozart re-worked it as a concerto for flute in D
major. The concerto is a widely studied piece for both instruments and
is one of the more important concertos in the oboe repertoire.
As an oboe concerto, this music is not only expressive and melodious,
but also perfectly idiomatic (flutists had long wondered why, for
example, Mozart gave them so few high notes). There are three
movements in the traditional arrangement (fast-slow-fast), each
distinguished not so much by design as by the kind of gift for natural,
memorable melody that few composers ever possess. The first and last
movements are in the home key of C major, while the second
movement is in the subdominant key of F major.

The first movement is headed 2 Allegro aperto (open allegro), an unconventional marking that Mozart favored at the time—he used it to open the Turkish violin concerto written in 1775—that seems to connote big-boned, generously paced fast music. The slow movement, like many of Mozart's finest, suggests an expansive, eloquent opera aria. The orchestral accompaniment, discreet throughout the concerto, is particularly restrained here; the spotlight never strays from the oboe soloist at center stage. The finale is actually a preview of an opera still five years in the future, The Abduction from the Seraglio. There, in her act 2 aria "Welche Wonne, welche Lust," Blonde sings of bliss and delight. Here the oboe is less explicit, but its message is clearly one of unbounded joy.

Mozart composed his oboe concerto between April and September 1777; the following winter he made an arrangement of it as the Flute Concerto in D major. The orchestra consists of pairs of oboes and horns, with strings.

Orphee aux enfers - Overture

Jacques Offenbach

German-born French composer Jacques Offenbach (June 20, 1819 – October 5, 1880) was born in Cologne. His fame as a composer stems from his writing almost 100 operettas in the 1850s to 1870s and his



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works set many precedents that influenced many operetta composers that followed, especially Johann Strauss II and Arthur Sullivan. Many of his works were revived during the 20th century and some continue to be revived in the modern day.

Orphée aux enfers, or in English, Orpheus in the Underworld, was a comic opera with music by Jacques Offenbach and words by Hector Crémieux and Ludovic Halévy. It was first performed as a two-act "opéra bouffon" at the Théâtre des Bouffes-Parisiens, Paris, on 21 October 1858, and was extensively revised and expanded in a four-act "opéra féerie" version, presented at the Théâtre de la Gaîté, Paris, on 7 February 1874. "Opéra bouffon" is a genre of the late 19th-century French operetta, closely associated with Jacques Offenbach, who produced many of them at the Théâtre des Bouffes-Parisiens that gave its name to the form. Opéras bouffes are known for elements of comedy, satire, parody and farce.

The opera is a lampoon of the ancient legend of Orpheus and Eurydice. In this version Orpheus is not the son of Apollo but a rustic violin teacher. He is glad to be rid of his wife, Eurydice, when she is abducted by the god of the underworld. Orpheus has to be bullied by Public Opinion into trying to rescue Eurydice. The reprehensible conduct of the gods of Olympus in the opera was widely seen as a veiled satire of the court and government of Napoleon III, Emperor of the French. Some critics expressed outrage at the librettists' disrespect for classic mythology and the composer's parody of Gluck's opera Orfeo ed Euridice; others praised the piece highly.

Orphée aux enfers was Offenbach's first full-length opera. The original 1858 production became a box-office success, and ran well into the following year, rescuing Offenbach and his Bouffes company from financial difficulty.

The Comedians

Dmitri Kabalevsky

Dmitri Kabalevsky (December 30, 1904 – February 14, 1987) The Comedians, Op. 26, is an orchestral suite of ten numbers by Dmitry Kabalevsky. It is one of his best-known and best-loved works. It was composed in 1938 to accompany a stage play called Inventor and Comedian at the Central Children's Theatre of Moscow. The play, centered on a group of traveling entertainers, is seldom seen today, but the lighthearted and energetic songs, dances, and interludes composed for it continue to be performed in the form of an orchestral suite arranged by Kabalevsky in 1940.

The 10 selections that make up the suite are the "Prologue," "Galop," "March," "Waltz," "Pantomime," "Intermezzo," "Little Lyrical Scene," "Gavotte," "Scherzo," and "Epilogue." Most feature Kabalevsky's inventive use of percussion and his preference for quick, lively rhythms. A wry sense of humor is also evident. "March" is alternately somber and tipsy, and the "Waltz" comes complete with a rhythmic "oom-pah" brass line. At times, echoes of Felix Mendelssohn appear, particularly in the "Intermezzo" and "Scherzo," which are reminiscent of their counterparts in A Midsummer Night's Dream. The suite concludes with the jovial "Epilogue," which resurrects the theme of the first movement.

Concerto Competition Winner 2019-2020: Aya Rokeach, Oboe



Aya Rokeach joined BYO three years ago at age ten. She first decided she wanted to play oboe at age five, when she heard one in an orchestra in her hometown of Oakland, California. She began oboe lessons at age seven with Tom Nugent, and continued her playing and reed making pursuits with Sue Crum and Ruth Stuart Burroughs. Recently,

Aya performed three pieces at Davies Symphony Hall in three orchestras at the Bay Area Youth Orchestra Festival. She loves playing in BYO and has learned so much from Jay Lehmann and the BYO coaches. Aya is proud to be this year's BYO concerto competition winner and is so excited to play for you. The Mozart Oboe Concerto is one of her favorite pieces, and she has drawn inspiration from interpretations by Eugene Izotov and François Leleux. She hopes very much that you enjoy it. Aya would like to thank all of her teachers, coaches, and the extraordinary Jay Lehmann for their wisdom, encouragement, and guidance over the years.

Theater in Los Angeles. He has been featured playing new music with adventurous ensembles such as the sfSoundGroup, Earplay, San Francisco Contemporary Players, the Berkeley New Music Ensemble, Sonor, and Octagon. He is also a member of the Circadian String



Quartet, a group that specializes in contemporary music. David Ryther graduated with highest honors in music from UC Santa Cruz and recently received his doctorate in contemporary violin performance from UC San Diego. Important mentors of his have included Janos Negyesy, Roy Malan, Roy Oakley, Ravi Shankar, and George Lewis. David Ryther can also be found playing in the Berkeley Symphony and the San Francisco Ballet Orchestra. As a music educator, David Ryther is on faculty at the Crowden Center for music in the Community and is Assistant conductor of the Villa Sinfonia, and he is a violin coach with the Berkeley Youth Orchestra. David has had his own compositions premiered around the United States and the world including in Cork Ireland, Scotland, and England and he made his Carnegie Hall conducting debut last summer with the Villa Sinfonia.

daughter of two musicians, Karen Paik began learning piano at age 4 and violin at age 9. She studied under Doris Fukawa, Anne Crowden, and Virginia Baker, and holds a BA in Music from UC Berkeley. She maintains an active private violin and piano studio and is particularly interested in the development of the whole student, focusing on proper form, technique, literacy, and musicianship right from the start. To that end, in addition to serving as the viola coach at BYO and member of its

Artist in Residence string quartet, she volunteers regularly with her local elementary school's fifth graders during their beginning violin class, operating with the philosophy that good habits must be nurtured and bad habits avoided from the beginning because they are so difficult to overcome. As an artist, she enjoys playing at open houses, parties, weddings, church services, as well as on stage and in the pit. She has traveled to Hong Kong, Malaysia, Singapore, Italy, France, and Spain with the San Francisco Symphony Youth Orchestra, and has performed throughout the Bay Area and out of state, including with Northbrook Symphony, Adrian Symphony, Cantabella Children's Chorus, Cambrian Symphony, Benicia Ballet, Livermore Valley Opera, Stockton Symphony, Symphony Napa Valley, and Vallejo Symphony. Karen lives with her husband and their two children who continue the family BYO legacy: one who has completed her own three years at BYO, and the other who is in her third year here.
